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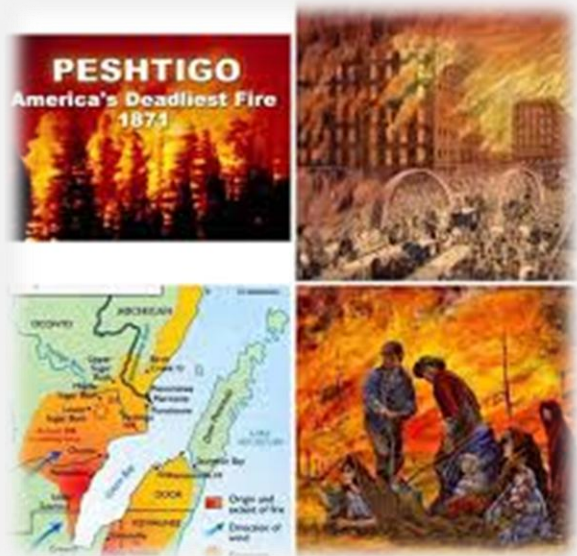
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What happened in October History

1. On October 8, 1871, [the Peshtigo Fire](#), the deadliest wildfire in U.S. history, devastated northern Wisconsin on the same night as the Great Chicago Fire. According to the [National Weather Service](#), it killed more than 1,200 people and likely was caused by a brush fire started by railroad workers clearing tracks.



2. On October 25, 1415, during the [Battle of Agincourt](#), French knights, burdened by heavy armor, struggled to advance across a rain-soaked, muddy battlefield. This severely hindered their mobility, contributing to their defeat against the more agile English forces.

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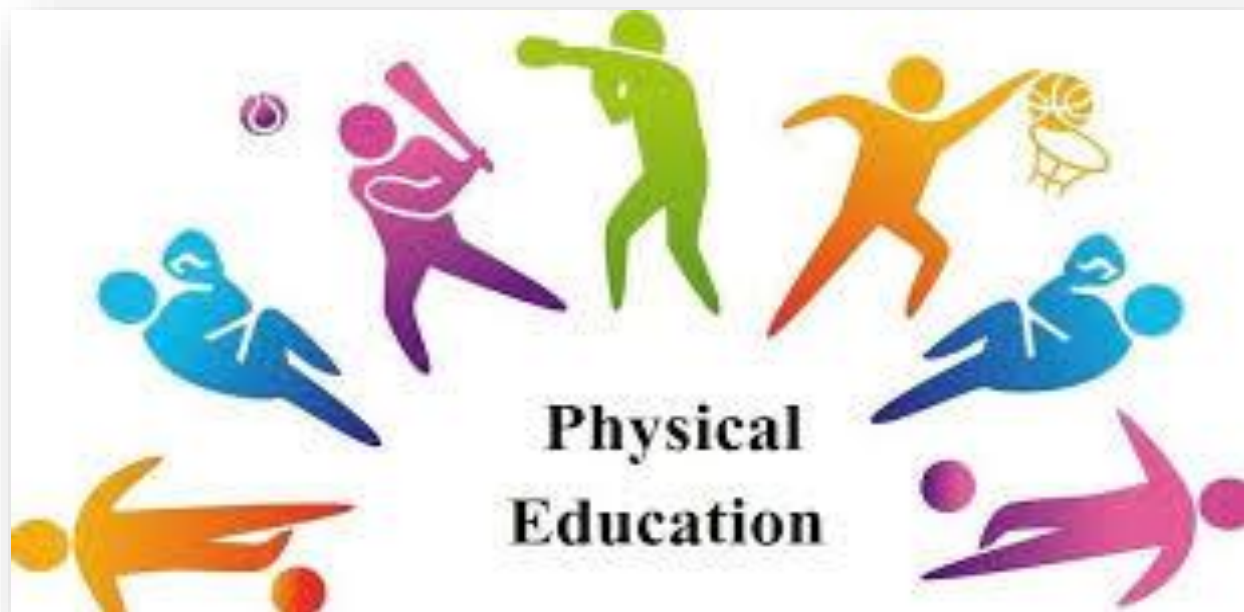
